

HOMESHARE

We continue to connect people through housing and have observed the profound impact a homeshare can have on two or more lives.



Homesharing is a two-way exchange without rent. More people who can share their home are needed. The only requirements are; a spare bedroom, a kitchen and bathroom to share, a willingness to get to know someone and some ideas of what someone else can do for you. Does that sound like you?

If so give Di a ring or send a message and enquire further about what a Homeshare can do for you. Di's work is to screen for suitability and safety. Sharers are introduced and they consider together if the foundations of a mutual exchange-based relationship are present. An introduction and matching can lead to a whole new world of connections for both parties. We commence with a one-month trial, then contract for 6 months at a time. Contact Di on 0499309418 and leave a message.

Recognition of the value and need for homesharing is building across Australia. There is an Australian homesharers community of practice with members from Queensland, Western Australia, NSW, South Australia, Victoria and of course New Zealand. Everyone has a slightly different set of circumstances but enough similarities to learn from each other. The COP is supported by Homeshare Australia and New Zealand Association (HANZA).

The work we are doing here in Mount Alexander to build a Homeshare community from the ground up, has been recognised by HANZA as an outstanding example of how communities can work together to meet local needs. We have been invited to participate in a study of local homeshares, so that others may learn good practice from us and build their own.

TENANTS RIGHTS WORKING GROUP

We are planning a forum on tenants' rights to raise awareness of these rights, support tenants in ensuring these rights are complied with and to capture emerging issues/gaps for tenants regarding their rights and the rental systems to share with Consumer Affairs Victoria.

We are inviting Tenants Union Victoria, Housing Justice and our Rental Tenancy Commissioner to attend the forum.

Your rental minimum standards rights

All Victorians should have access to a fair and safe rental market. If your rental agreement started after 29 March 2021, your rental provider (landlord) **must ensure their property meets minimum standards before you move in.**

TENANTS RIGHTS WORKING GROUP (CONT.)

If you've identified an advertised rental property that doesn't meet minimum standards, **report it.** If you've already signed the contract but haven't moved in yet, you can:

- · end the agreement immediately, or
- move in and request urgent repairs.

If your home falls below the minimum standards during your agreement, request that your rental provider make urgent repairs. Your provider must also arrange regular **gas and electrical safety checks** and fix and pay for any broken **smoke alarms**.

Contact us using our **complaint form** if your rental provider or agent hasn't organised a timely repair.

ROUGH SLEEPER ACTION GROUP AND SUPPORTING OTHERS IN HOUSING CRISIS

The rough sleeper action group (Dhelkaya Health Housing Team, MASC, Vic Pol, Arc Justice, MHN, Salvation Army) works together to improve the integrated supports for the 38 people sleeping rough in our Shire.

We are encouraging local accommodation providers to release more of their accommodation as crisis and transition housing.

The MHN is also trying to find more affordable long-term rentals for local community members (mostly women) who are currently in month-to-month unaffordable leases which is very stressful. We have found a few more affordable longer-term rentals for a few of these women but if anyone knows of options for the others-please get in touch cneilson@castlemainehealth.org.au

COLLECTIVE HOUSING MODELS CONVERSATION UPDATE

We have held four conversations on collective housing and some of the actions emerging from conversations:

- Building on Homeshare, Community Land Trust (see MACLL and MAAHT) and THOW
- Interest in secondary dwellings Victorian State Government housing statement <u>Secondary</u> <u>dwellings planning</u>. A secondary dwelling less than 60 ms square and with no overlay no longer needs a planning permit. To check about overlays see-<u>Planning property report</u>
- Planning-You can check what planning is required for a particular piece of land via: <u>Mount</u>
 <u>Alexander Planning Scheme Maps</u> It really depends on the piece of land, zoning, area and size
 of land

We have hit the ground running by being publicly very supportive of Mount Alexander Shire Council resolving to establish Mount Alexander Affordable Housing Trust and a \$500,000 startup fund. Congratulations to everyone involved in this milestone initiative. MAAHT is an important validation and umbrella for all of us seeking affordable cooperative housing in the Shire.

Furthermore, we have begun researching land for Community Land Trusts for different target audiences.

We will announce in September an October public meeting to share our vision and to invite people to Express an Interest for CLT campaigns we will launch. We will have an updated website by then as well.

Castlemaine Institute and the Resilient Building Council are offering free energy efficiency and resilience home assessments to 150 households in Mount Alexander Shire. These assessments provide professional recommendations to enhance year-round comfort, reduce energy bills, and manage risks from natural hazards such as bushfires, floods, storms, and extreme heat.

We invite applications from a range of house types - old and new, weatherboard, brick, brick veneer. We know communities are stronger when they work together and encourage you to get your neighbourhood involved.

The data collected will inform strategies to improve the resilience and energy efficiency of homes throughout the region. This will inform a cost benefit business case to support future policy and investment in whole of home retrofits.

VACANT DWELLINGS

Our discussions with owners of vacant dwellings have resulted in nine vacant dwellings released as affordable rentals, 3 shop tops released as affordable rentals and three as transition housing.

One property owner encourages others to join her, saying

"Offering this kind of affordable rental is just such a simple, but life-changing way to be part of a community. We reckon houses are for living in. And ours is lived in and cared for, while the reduced rent covers our outgoing costs. We worked all this out directly with the resident/tenant, who we connected with through the local grapevine. She's fantastic and we really value the relationship we've got with her."

AIR B'N'B'S

Great report by Grounded <u>Grounded Community Land Trusts</u> which looks at the impact of Short-Term Rental (STR) on communities in Australia's tier one tourism towns.

The report recommends an innovative cap 'n trade approach to rebalance the market towards long term trends.

Airbnb Cap 'n Trade Explainer - Grounded

The Airbnb cap n trade system is covered in <u>ABC article</u>, <u>the Business</u> and NOW <u>CH9 news</u>.

Thurs July 4th, 6pm is <u>an event discussing the policy</u> and how it can help reduce the rate of change in our communities, whilst adding resilience through Community Land Trusts.

Our Shire has a lower Air BnB percentage to long term rentals and occupied dwellings than some other shires but this report and advocacy is significant in an integrated approach to addressing the housing crisis.

We have 1300 rentals, approx. 330 air BnBs and 8,400 occupied dwellings.

STATE GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION ON PLANNING ACROSS HOUSING, TRANSPORT, INFRASTRUCTURE ETC

The State is indicating that this consultation and the subsequent policy and legislation will shape Statewide planning across housing, transport, infrastructure etc.

I would really encourage everyone, as groups and collectives, and individually, to have your say. They have a map-based system where your input is linked to location, so it should give a good picture of local issues and priorities if everyone gets online and submits.
